

Bubble Tea

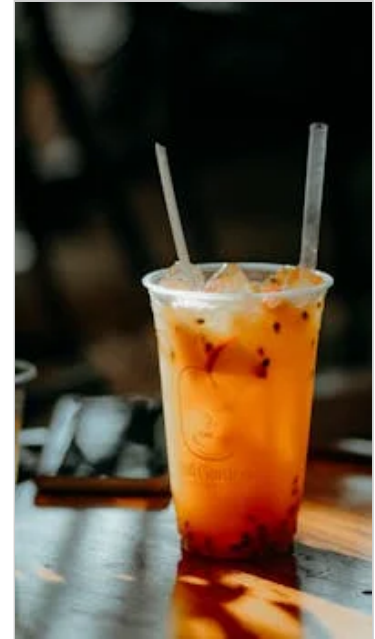
